# Is there a way to stop my search history being tracked both by Google and my own computer?

Incognito mode will erase cookies upon closing the browser window.

Google will not store browsing history, take snapshots of pages or keep a record of your downloads.

Downloaded files and bookmarks will be kept.

Going incognito does not hide your browsing
from an administrator or ISP.

Who owns my content?
You do.

# How can I stop Chrome from installing cookies?

Choose 'block sites from setting any data' in Advanced Settings > Content Settings.

### What happens to my information if Google merges or is acquired?

It will ensure confidentiality and notify users before any personal information is transferred or becomes subject to a new privacy policy.

What information does
Chrome collect and share?

IP address, device info, search queries, passwords and other settings.
AutoFill text if you log in and store that data on your account.

What personal information does Chrome require?

None.

#### How does Google use the information Chrome collects?

To send you targeted ads, customized search results, and spam and malware detection.

Does Google share information from its 'location services' feature?

Yes, but will anonymize it.



# Does Google share my information with third parties?
